### **School Portrait, c.1916-1919, East Hampton, N.Y.**

Do you still have your childhood school pictures? The Long Island Collection doesn't have many (aside from our [East Hampton High School yearbook collection](#)), but we appreciate the few we do have. Often, school pictures provide the only images available of a relative or prominent local figure before they became well known. This photograph came from the family of Josephine Passamonte DeAmario, who let us scan some of their saved school pictures, which are now about a century old. The photo above shows Josephine's brother, Joseph Passamonte (b. 1910), in front of the [East Hampton Primary School](#) on Newtown Lane with his class.

Joseph was the second of five siblings born to "Anna" (Antonia) and "Salvey" (Saverio) Passamonte. Joseph's parents were Italian immigrants who came to East Hampton in 1908. Salvey worked as a mason for *Barnes Brothers* before working as a caretaker for the Town disposal grounds. The Passamonte boys, who frequently appeared in local newspaper coverage of baseball games, initially followed their father into the masonry business. Later, Joseph worked as a clerk at a 5 & 10 store, and

served in the Army during World War II, eventually moving to Schenectady.

We don't know who all of the children in this photograph are, but the ones we know have familiar local names, like Maurice Mott, who was one of the nine Mott boys who grew up playing in the lumberyard with Bucket Daniels. We would love to know if you recognize one of these unidentified children.

Judging by appearances, and [Joseph's later school picture](#), the class is probably a Kindergarten or first grade, which would date the photo between 1916 and 1919. At this time, *The East Hampton Star* recorded Mrs. Rosalie Tucker, Mrs. Catherine Wade, and Miss Mary Eldredge as teaching those classes. Regardless of the teacher's name, she had her work cut out for her, getting 40 fidgeting students to stand still for a picture!
